

### Welcome from our Chief Executive

With a reported 1 million young people registered as needing support with their mental health, there is a definite need for our services. This year, in celebration of our 5th birthday, we have organised a full AGM, in recognition of the amazing support that our young people, Trustees, funders and community and business partners have given to us across that period and to thank them for their continued support. We are particularly delighted Durham's Lord Lieutenant, Sue Snowden has agreed to be our guest of honour. Having launched Building Self-Belief five years ago, she continues to be a great supporter of our charity.

Our impact is far reaching and has been recognised over the past year at a regional level which is a tremendous honour for the charity. Last October, I was delighted to attend the North East Charity Awards, as a guest of Haines Watts to celebrate our corporate partnership for our highly successful Employability programme. Our Youth Panel goes from strength to strength, and in March we were delighted to receive the Durham High Sherriff's Award in recognition of their work. Additionally, in July 2023, we attended the North East Charity Awards, for our outstanding contribution to social change.

Building Self-Belief received a huge boost from the National Lottery Heritage Fund to support us in celebrating Consett's Industrial heritage relating to the 160th anniversary of the former Consett ironworks. Allowing us to invest funds in line with our priorities and deliver a two-year project to continue to help our young people develop a greater appreciation of their past, alongside a greater understanding of their future.

In addition to our Employability, Heritage and Environmental programmes, we extended our services to more traditional youth club settings. Plus, as many of our local communities faced a tough winter of economic hardship, we accessed the County Durham Community Foundation's – 'Poverty Hurts' fund. We successfully provided well attended 'Food & Fuel Poverty Family Activity Clubs', which included a 'Children's Activity Club' as well as a 'Jobs & Budgeting Support Group' for local parents and carers. These also provided a warm space in the evening, hot food and drink and winter clothing if required, for those in attendance.

As part of our Business Plan, we have continued the huge undertaking of developing an online Emotional Wellbeing Resource Hub, accessible via our website. This shall provide an opportunity for organisations to purchase additional resources from us to support our financially sustainability by generating a long-term income for the charity.

We remain committed to engaging with our funders, volunteers, and the young people that we support in building stronger communities for the future.

#### Teenage Boys Bereavement & Loss Mental Wellbeing Programme Cardinal Hume Catholic School, Gateshead



Funded by the Albert Hunt Trust we successfully delivered a twelve-week wellbeing programme to support vulnerable teenage boys in Gateshead, in an area of high socio-economic deprivation. This programme focused on early interventions to prevent long-term mental health issues, particularly those suffering due to complex domestic circumstances. Additionally, one of their peers had recently lost their life as a victim of knife crime, and the programme provided an opportunity for them to discuss the issues around bereavement and personal loss linked to this.

Collectively, the boys reported a major improvement in their all-round wellbeing, as they were getting better sleep and had a more nutritious diet. They became better behaved, received fewer sanctions related to poor behaviour, both at school and home, as the programme progressed and promised to continue to do so after the programmed finished.

The boys particularly enjoyed going bowling as a group, and they were very excited to have the opportunity to do this all together. They also loved the bauble painting and card making sessions, where having some creative freedom and the opportunity to produce something for themselves and for their family, made a real and lasting impact on the boys. Overall, they were a great group to work with and they were appreciative and thoughtful during the sessions.

### Teenage Girls Bereavement & Loss Mental Health Programme Cardinal Hume Catholic School, Gateshead



Our Year 9 Girls programme at Cardinal Hume Catholic School was a great success. Funded by The Shears Foundation, we successfully delivered a twelve-week wellbeing programme, to support the young people in improving their emotional wellbeing. It provided a great opportunity for the girls to realise that they were not alone with the range of issues that they faced in life.

Body image was a key topic that the girls felt impacted on their self-esteem. The pressure that many young people face about the way they look and how others perceive them was making some of them really miserable. We provided them with strategies to cope with these feelings as well as reshape the way they think within social situations and at school. Talking about it within the group helped them to realise that they could achieve much more if they had more confidence in themselves.

The girls loved our outdoor pursuits day, where they put their newfound skills and confidence to the test. One of the main reasons for offering this day was because they are activities where it does not matter what you look like. It took them out of their comfort zones as it was something that they had never done before. They particularly loved the water activities as it was a chance for them to let their hair down with their friends, work as a team, not worry about how they looked and successfully overcome a range of challenges together.

They were a real pleasure to support as a group and the girls all reported how positive the impact of the programme had been for them.







### Teenage Boys Bereavement & Loss Mental Health Programme

#### North Durham Academy, Stanley

Our twelve-week wellbeing programme, funded by the Stanley Community Fund, successfully improved the wellbeing of a group of year 9 boys, from various domestic circumstances, including blended families, minimal parental contact or being looked after.

As a result of the programme all the boys showed huge improvements in their self-esteem. They enjoyed the camaraderie of the group and many of them reported their friendship with each other had improved and they were coping better with their family situations, alongside, improvements in their anger management.

The boys particularly enjoyed going karting, as it was an activity they could enjoy collectively as a group. The visit to the Newcastle Quayside and Sambuca's restaurant, also developed their experiences and a group and helped them to build their confidence and independence. This trip was a great example of how the boys used their newfound empathy when supporting other group members throughout the trip. We were also delighted that three of the boys volunteered to support our community garden project as Stanley Eco-Ambassadors and wanted to continue to work with us.

The group really pushed themselves out of their comfort zone across the programme and we were very proud of their efforts.

Thank you to the County Durham Community Foundation and the Stanley Community Fund for supporting the programme and providing us with the opportunity to work with a fabulous group of young people.

#### Teenage Boys Bereavement & Loss Mental Health Programme Haughton Academy, Darlington



Thanks to the County Durham Community Foundation – Darlington Grants Programme, we worked with a group of vulnerable young people from Darlington, an area of high socio-economic deprivation. The boys were experiencing a diverse range of challenging circumstances within their domestic circumstances around family dynamics, bereavement and loss. We believed it was important for the boys to share their experiences, to not only get support from other boys in similar situations, but to develop their empathy and understanding for people they originally knew little about.

Having the opportunity to talk through the issues that affected them, and to listen to others in similar situations, gave them a greater appreciation of how to manage their day to day lives and to regulate their moods. Having the opportunity to talk through their emotions and work on their anger management was also particularly useful for them. Additionally, they responded well to sessions on future planning, where they established definite ideas about their future life goals and pathways to reach them.

The group karting experience gave our young people to support one another and to build a team ethos in a supportive environment. They were a fabulous group of young people, who flourished across the duration of the programme.

A huge thank you also to the County Durham Community Foundation – Darlington Grants Programme for their support with this programme, and also to Warburtons Community Grants for providing additional support for the trip.











#### A Greener Future for Stanley North Durham Academy, Stanley

Our big environmental project this year has been the planning, development, and creation of a Wellbeing Community Garden in Stanley, County Durham.

Our volunteer Eco Ambassadors were local Year 9 children who did an amazing job. They fully embraced the programme from the initial planning stage to ensure that they created a biodiverse garden, focused on upcycling. This included creating their own 'Bug Hotels' and upcycling old tyres that they planters with bee friendly plants such as Lavender.

The results were amazing! They now have a completed community garden with apples, cherry, pear and plum trees. There are brand new green oak planters filled with Mediterranean herbs, English herbs and wild strawberries. Our Eco Ambassadors created new beds which were dug out, lined with aluminium and then planted with a whole host of perennials.

The final large edition were the three large green oak benches to provide a place for people to sit and relax. During this programme, we were helped by numerous community volunteers who gave up their free time in the holidays to help us get the project off the ground and do some of the heavier work. This helped to make the garden a true community collaboration.

#### Teenage Boys & Consett Teenage Girls Youth Social Action Programme Consett Academy, Consett



This programme was kindly supported by The County Durham Community Foundation - #iwill Youth Social Action Programme and St James's Place. It also built upon the success of the work that we with the Consett Academy Wellbeing Garden last year, which we used as a venue for some of our wellbeing sessions.

The young people engaged in a range of community action to improves the local environment as well as participating in a range of creative arts, personal wellbeing and local heritage-based activities related to Consett's industrial past. These were also supported by our partnership with the Derwentside Detached Youth programme at Glenroyd House in Consett.

At Building Self-Belief, we believe it is important for our young people to take leadership, which the group did by decorating the community garden and also organising and preparing food for a school music event. The children also put their teamwork and decision making skills to the test in trip to the Exit Rooms in Newcastle and then went on to Sambuca's at the Quayside for refreshments.

# Our Heritage Programme

#### **Community Coronation Project** Tow Law Millennium Primary School, Tow Law



As part of King Charles III' coronation celebrations in May 2023, we delivered poetry, cookery, environmental and history-based activities to over 200 children from the Tow Law community, in County Durham.

The project culminated with a 'Coronation Community Tea & Celebration', which was held at Tow Law's community association hall during the coronation bank holiday weekend, which also showcased the creativity of the children's work.

We were delighted to bring our Youth Panel volunteers, the Tow Law Community Association, children, staff and parents from both Tow Law Millennium Primary School & Blessed John Duckett Primary School together in common celebration. It was especially pleasing to reengage

young people with the broader community after two-years of Covid-19 restrictions that made such projects extremely difficult.

We thank the National Lottery Community Fund for their kind support of this project.







#### **Community Heritage Project** The Consett Iron Company 160th Anniversary

In March 2023, we began a two-year community heritage programme, supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund. This will see us co-ordinate a range of local heritage initiatives, bringing together all generations, around the 160th anniversary of the 1864 foundation of Consett Iron Company.







We are already well underway with planning and delivering the key aspects of the project including: -





Oral history recordings, podcasts, and a 'Consett – Past & Present' anthology of intergenerational memories of former steelworkers and residents who witnessed the 'Red Dust' pollution, alongside modern Consett community experiences, including the refugees. These shall be recorded in community settings, across the project, and be released via social media and partner websites.



A series of local public history talks, on the people, experiences and events linked to Consett's industrial past.



Educational workshops in primary and secondary schools, promoting youth engagement in heritage linked to Consett Steelworks.

Art, creative writing, poetry and a film made by the local community for a series of events in 2024, to mark the 160th anniversary of Consett Iron Company.



Public exhibitions at locations across the local area.



A public debate hosted by Historic England at the Durham Miners' Association Hall (Redhills), around building a more sustainable future for Consett and how to make the area a better place to live, work or visit, in the context of its industrial past.



### **Derwentside Detached Youth Project**

When Megan got in touch and suggested that we work together on some activities for young people in Consett, we couldn't refuse such an opportunity. Consett's young people enjoyed drama workshops with the nationally touring Shoddy Theatre Company, and took part in a wide range of arts and wellbeing sessions.

We were also delighted that Tommy Anderson from Baseline Shift continued his work with us and delivered some art sessions to our young people. We are particularly proud of their collaboration to create a 'Consett Youth Banner'. This banner is the first in a series of three that we have planned as part of our Consett Heritage Project and will be launched on the 7th September 2023 as part of our ongoing Consett Heritage Project.

#### **Our Youth Panel**

Building Self-Belief Youth Panel is a group of youth representatives between the ages of 13-24, who live or go to school in Consett. Their role is to be the 'voice' of young people living in Consett and they work closely with us to ensure we are meeting the needs of young people.

They aim to guide and support the local people to take action to make Consett a more inviting place for our young people. Our Youth Panel has gone from strength to strength over the last year and we enjoyed another fabulous weekend at Morpeth Castle courtesy of The Landmark Trust, whereby they updated their Youth Manifesto. Our young people still have a strong focus on the environment and the need to recycle and work towards a circular economy. Additionally, as part of our Consett Heritage Project, our young people will be responsible for organising the events and delivering some of the sessions.

They have continued to support us on our environmental projects, coming along to help us with our North Durham Academy Community Garden.





#### **The 'Poverty Hurts' Project**

During a winter of spiralling heating and food costs that impacted the poorest in the community the hardest, we undertook a range of initiatives to support young people and their families at such a challenging time.

As part of the Warm Spaces fund, through the County Durham Community Foundation, we delivered £3000 worth of 'Winter Warmer' packs. These packs included essentials such as hats, gloves and hot water bottles, and were gifted to children alongside a Christmas present to assist struggling families over the festive period.

Our packs were distributed through Building Self-Belief's programmes as well as directly to local schools, situated in the bottom 20% of the National Index of Deprivation.

Our winter 'Children's Activity Club' and 'Jobs & Budgeting Support' clubs also provided County Durham families with a regular place to meet, reduce social isolation, receive warm food and drink, provide engaging activities for the children and offer support to adults around seeking employment, as well as debt management, at a time of crisis for many families.

Alongside this 'Poverty Hurts' funding from the County Durham Community Foundation, we also received support from the Derwent Valley Area Action Partnership in providing Christmas presents to children who were living in poverty across the Derwent Valley. These programmes were very successful and much needed, and we hope to be able to provide similar support to young people and families in need, once again this winter

#### Nuclear Institute Young Generation Network Niamh McDonald



Currently, we are in the process of taking on a community garden space in Benfieldside, Consett, an area previously identified by local residents as derelict. Once the legal aspects are completed, we will have a 25-year lease where we can create a fabulous social asset for the community and provide a great location for us to complete some of our community work.

We are excited to have recently secured significant funding from the County Durham Community Foundation 'Know your Neighbourhood' fund to help us in combatting multi-generational loneliness across the Consett area. Our Youth Panel and many new volunteers shall be integral to the planning and delivery of the community activities that this entails.

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We have been expanding, so has our need for space. In August, we moved to a much larger office. We love our new space - the next step is to get some new furniture, we are desperately in need of storage!

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
